Honda Exposes 40gb of Company Data

Global automobile manufacturer [Honda](#) leaked a database of company data that exposed 134 million documents, roughly 40GB of information.

In a [blog post](#), researcher xdesmus revealed how he discovered an Elasticsearch database without any authentication.

“The data contained within this database was related to the internal network and computers of Honda Motor Company. The information available in the database appeared to be something like an inventory of all Honda internal machines. This included information such as machine hostname, MAC address, internal IP, operating system version, which patches had been applied, and the status of Honda’s endpoint security software. I would like to thank the security team at Honda Motor Company for their very prompt action to secure the database shortly after being notified.” [READ MORE](#)

Where next for BIA?

It seems clear from Continuity Central's recent ['To BIA or not to BIA... revisited'](#) survey that the majority of business continuity professionals see the business impact analysis (BIA) as a vital aspect of the business continuity process... but is that the end of the conversation? Is the current bipolar state of the 'keep the BIA as it is' and 'ditch the BIA' discussion nuanced enough?

I would suggest that the answer to both the above questions is 'no'.

Those skeptical of the BIA criticize the process rather than the aim. Adaptive BC states that the BIA's main purpose is 'to help leadership identify the most critical services and to set a prioritization for continuity planning efforts'; and does not criticize this goal, rather it believes that 'executive leadership can be trusted to identify critical services based on their experience and knowledge of the organization and therefore can set general direction and prioritization for preparedness planning'. The premise is that executive leadership will know their own business well enough to provide the information that a BIA sets out to discover. Adaptive BC also points out that mission-creep has resulted in the BIA's purpose changing, expanding, and becoming indistinct over time. [READ MORE](#)

When It Comes to Employee Security Awareness Training - Should You be Phishing or Teaching?

When it comes to employee awareness training, many organizations opt for phishing testing to gauge the state of their employee awareness. Others choose to phish and then teach via follow-up educational awareness content. Unfortunately, neither strategies are effective if your end goal is to change employee behavior towards phishing attacks.

Set Them Up for Success

Remember that “night-before-exam” anxiety? Most of us remember feeling a little nervous about taking a test; some of us experienced real panic attacks before a big math final, a driver’s license test and other occasions when our performance had been put to the test.

Testing is considered a valid tool to evaluate knowledge and performance after a learning experience has occurred. However, it is not an effective tool to introduce and reinforce the learning itself. In fact, in order to validate a test, it should cover more than one phishing attack scenario. One phishing simulation, which is the common practice with many vendor solutions, will not provide any significant data about risk level or awareness status. [READ MORE](#)
